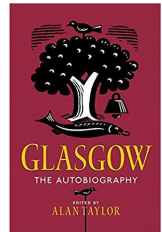


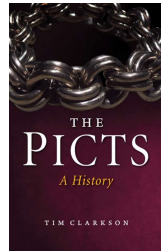

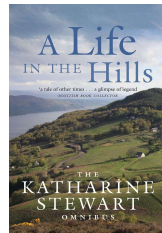
**Scotland: A History from Earliest Times**

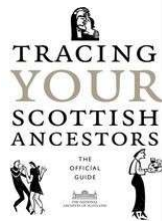
**Glasgow: The Autobiography** *Alan Taylor*

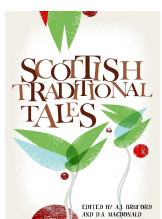
**The Picts: A History** *Tim Clarkson*

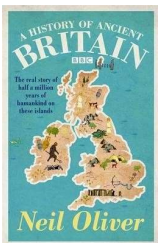


**The Lowland Clearances** *Peter Aitchison*

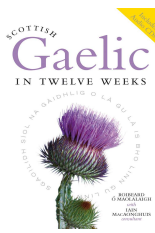
**Whisky Galore** *Compton Mackenzie*
